Pastor's Corner

"I will tell the coming generations the glorious deeds of the Lord and the wonders he has done...that the next generation might tell them to their children, so that they should set their hope in God." (Ps. 78:3-7)

Years ago when our youth group took a mission trip to New Mexico, we visited Cacho Natural Historic Park where we saw monumental structures which had been erected by the ancestral Pueblo people from 85O to 125O AD. Imagine our wonder when the park ranger informed us that the native people had used flying buttresses to provide structural support



and hold up the roofs of some of their buildings at the same time they were becoming a dominant feature in the building of European Gothic Cathedrals like Notre Dame. The Pueblo people had learned this skill on their own, independent of European builders.

While Pueblo houses of worship were built underground and were considered the heart of the community, houses of worship in Europe were erected above ground, often as magnificent works of art that would draw people together into community and into the mysterious presence of God. Beyond the experience of awe that these architectural wonders elicit, isn't it stunning to think about the amount of time and work that went into building them? Erecting a cathedral is a long and arduous task, with one generation depending upon the next to complete the next stage until the magnificent work of art is complete. Those who laid the foundation had to trust that future believers would continue what they started. Those who erected the walls had to trust those who followed to build the flying buttresses to support those walls. They, in turn, had to trust in those who would finish the work and add the spire. Day by day, stone by stone – a cathedral was slowly built from the ground up.

In the same way, a temple is being built in our hearts by the many people who have helped shape us — grandparents, parents, teachers, pastors, mentors. Day by day and stone by stone — nurturing word by nurturing word — our faith is built from the ground up through the hands of those who have helped shape us. Who are the builders who have helped give shape to the temple that has been gently sculpted in your heart over the years? What mentors do you recall among that great cloud of witnesses whose faith has helped build yours?

Every year at this time, we prepare for our consecration Sunday (November 3) and considering our financial pledge to the church. As we do so, we look with a deep feeling of gratitude upon those who have had a significant hand in building our church since its beginning nearly 15O years ago – its people, its ministries, its mission, its facilities. As we build on the shoulders of those who've gone before us, we see how God's faithfulness has been evident in their faithful giving and how it has inspired our own. What we give through our time, talents, and treasures provides the mortar to continue building upon the ministries of the past in anticipation of all the good that is to come in the future.

It is a privilege and pleasure to be fellow builders with you, knowing that our children and grandchildren and following generations will be nurtured in the love of Jesus Christ because of the gifts we give today.

1. <u>Connextion Ministry Team</u> – With the excitement and good attendance for the summer series on Overcoming Bias led by Elizabeth Klein, it was decided to ask Robin Stangland to lead the 3 Practices method



of discussing difficult issues in the Adult Ed hour from 9-10:00am on the last two Sunday mornings of September. Then beginning Sunday, October 6th, Elizabeth will begin leading a class, **FREEDOM IN CHRIST** from Galatians.

(NOTE: Two Connextion groups are starting up for members to join. Wednesday morning with Pastor Charlie and Wednesday evening with Jon Bishop. The Sunday 9:00 am group is joining the class.)



2. <u>Family Ministry Team</u> - Shelagh Hizzey has hosted the Youth group through the summer with Pool parties. Christ the King Lutheran Church has joined for three of them. While Pastor Charlie is working with her, she is requesting help from the congregation and would appreciate your support

3. <u>Mission Ministry Team</u> – Heidi Saikaly reports faithfully about the situation in Gaza and The West Bank. This month was the visit of Zoughbi Zoughbi and arranging for him to speak many places about his conflict resolution work in the West Bank.

- 4. **Prayers & Squares** Sue Davis reports a busy month with 7 quilts in the pipeline. With new members and more organization we have managed to bring half of them to the congregation for prayers. We appreciate your participation in sending in prayers for the people we serve and giving us names of people who might need comfort and prayers!
- 5. <u>Women's Ministry Team</u> Linda Mueller reports the work of the summer Farmer's Market, Bunco coming up at her home in October, and a Book Study in November in the Lakeview Hall on November 16th. Women who would like to join their team are welcome to talk with her.
- 6. <u>Sanctuary Refresh</u> Jon Bishop passed out two designs for the sanctuary chancel configuration for us to comment on. He also requested Session to recommend the next steps of the project. Further discussion was tabled until the October meeting.

BUSINESS:

- Treasurer's Report: A positive bottom line for the July was reported. Training for Ministry Team Leader's budgets has begun, with mission, vision and team descriptions reviewed also.
- A Session retreat has been rescheduled for November 16th.
- The Interim Search Task Force has two candidates to interview soon.
- The playground project is taking shape. Thanks to donations of funds and labor from Ray Pettigrew, Vern Fox and Jim Kassebaum.
- Session voted to approve the contract with McDonald-Miller for the relocation of the
 electrical panel last month. At Finance Committee's request, we reassessed that decision and
 after review Session confirmed its vote and the contract was signed. This will require we not
 have power in the church for at least two weeks while it's being installed, likely in the late
 fall/early winter time frame.
- Nominating Committee has filled 3 positions for elders and 2 for deacons while still interviewing and praying for 2 more deacons.
- Carol Mastrofini updated Session on the strategic planning that the SWOT exercise started for us. This will be helpful for the interim period also.
- Session voted to adopt a statement reflecting our core value of inclusion to be printed in the Sunday bulletin: "Welcome to FPCS. We seek to be an affirming church where all people are welcomed. We desire to have an open heart and mind to diverse narratives, honoring the voices of those silenced and harmed by not being heard." Session also approved including the full inclusion statement on a quarterly basis.
- Session also approved a spoken statement for worship:
 - "Welcome to FPCS. We are a church seeking to reflect the Spirit of Christ as we live into our mission of growing deeper in faith and reaching wider in love.

In this place, you are respected as a child of God.

No matter your age, marital status, sexuality or gender identity,

whether you're a lifelong Christian or a spiritual seeker,

whoever you are, wherever you're from, whatever burdens you carry,

whatever questions and doubts you bring, you are welcome here.

- With 10 new members since June, our clerk reports total membership is 226.
- Session is considering how to proceed with devotions as the Barton book seems to not meet the needs of all.

Next Session meeting is October 7th at 6 pm.

These gifts help lift families out of poverty by providing income, nourishment, pest control, weed control, pollination, and fertilizer. As their income grows, they can provide better housing, medical care, and education for their children.

Did you know that 1 good hen can lay up to 200 eggs a year? Each starter flock has 10–50 chicks, so that means somewhere between 2,000–10,000 eggs a year per flock!

While the challenges of hunger and poverty are even bigger than the challenge of summiting Mount Everest, God's power to provide has been at work multiplying our efforts! Because of a matching donation event, an additional 2 of everything we donated will be sent out to more families in need. These gifts will continue to multiply, as families receiving these gifts will not only be able to provide for themselves, but also pass on the training and extra offspring to others in their communities. Talk about an avalanche of blessings!


Thank You!

That is an increase from the drive that we did in March. We'll be back in March 2025 and hope to do even more!




More Kids = More Fun!


Women's Book Club
