(Phil 3:13-14)

In the Old Testament, we find the forty-year journey of wandering through the wilderness that proves necessary for fashioning a people who were to be a blessing to the rest of the world. 

Our bee-loved assistant pastor, Elizabeth Klein, will be leaving us this month. She came as a support to pastor Charlie and has been a true blessing to us all.



Need a Huddle?


Well, maybe not, but in these days of winter it can be a warm place to be with a group of friends who travel along with you on your walk of faith, sharing, learning, praying.



STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE: COMMUNICATION TEAM LISTENING GROUPS

As part of the Session's ongoing efforts to chart a course for our church's future, we've formed strategic planning teams to address key areas identified earlier in the year. The first of these teams is the **Communication Team**, and we're excited to share what they've been working on over the last couple of months. The Communication Team, led by Carol Mastrofini, Carlene Crossman and Carole Van Loo, has begun gathering small listening groups to hear directly from the congregation. These groups are designed to provide a space for you to share your thoughts on our internal and external communication, with discussions centered around three key questions:

- What aspects of our communication should we preserve?
- What areas could be improved?
- Are there opportunities for innovation we should consider?

Groups of 2-4 participants have begun to meet after worship services on selected Sundays for 1-2 hours. You will only be asked to participate once, but your input will be invaluable in helping the team shape a communication strategy that reflects the needs and hopes of our congregation.




Since last summer, our Interim Pastor Search

Wednesday Bible Study: January 8, 15 and 22 at 10 AM



Our 6 week study on John Pavlovitz' "The Kind Human's Survival Guides ends on January 8 and we will start a new study on the 15th and 22nd using the book "Love is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times" by the beloved Episcopal Bishop, Michael Curry.

The Way of Love addresses the seemingly insurmountable challenges facing the world today: deep ideological divisions, competing claims to speak for God, poverty, racism, and violence. As historian and bestselling author John Meacham says "This is a profound and essential book... in which the priest (Curry) plays the prophet, drawing on his own remarkable life to show us the way we might make our own lives, and the lives of nations, warmer, better and nobler." Curry lives with and calls us to draw upon deep reservoirs of hope and resilience, simple wisdom, nonviolence, and a high regard for human dignity.

You are invited to order a new or used copy of the book for use in the class or personal reading on your own. As the descendant of slaves and the son of a civil rights activist, Bishop Michael Curry's life illustrates massive changes in our times. Much of the world met Bishop Curry when he delivered his sermon on the redemptive power of love at the royal wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle at Windsor Castle. Here, he expands on his message of hope in an inspirational road map for living the way of love, illuminated with moving lessons from his own life. Through the prism of his faith, ancestry, and personal journey, Love Is the Way shows us how America came this far and, more important, how to go a whole lot further.

The way of love is essential for addressing the seemingly insurmountable challenges facing the world today: poverty, racism, selfishness, deep ideological divisions, competing claims to speak for God. This book will lead readers to discover the gifts they need in order to live the way of love: deep reservoirs of hope and resilience, simple wisdom, the discipline of nonviolence, and unshakable regard for human dignity.

90% of pledges have been received and is 20% above last year. We are running a
deficit with the increasing costs, repairs and ministries needs. Details will be
available at the congregational meeting February 23. Session approved the 2025
budget.

Old Business:

- The electrical panel install has begun and may avoid missing a Sunday in the sanctuary. January 17 is projected completion date.
- Interim Pastor Search is getting close to extending the terms of call to a candidate who would begin February 9.
- There are two benevolence teams in the church: Deacons and At Large...inquire with Pastor Charlie

New Business:

- Orientation /Training of new elders will be Jan. 11.
- Talea Blasko is being interviewed to serve in a Youth Leader position! Personnel will handle this. Funds were set aside for this in the 2025 budget.

Approved:

- Laurie Robinson added to the Personnel Committee
- Terms of Call for Rev. Charlie Lewis for January 2025 will be used on the 2024 amounts divided by 12 to cover one month.
- After more chips are added to the playground and the inspector approves, the spring toys will be reinstalled.
- Next Session meeting is January 6, 2025 and will be conducted by Zoom as the power in the building will be turned off.
- The Annual Congregational Meeting will be held on February 23, 2025 after worship.
