Pastor's Corner

In one of the most memorable scenes of C.S. Lewis' wonderful closing book in the Chronicles of Narnia, a small group of children leave behind one stage of their faith journey and move with breathless anticipation into another. Out ahead of them, always just beyond their grasp, is Aslan, the great lion and Christ-figure, who leads his followers into a new world that is marvelous beyond imagining. "Don't stop," Aslan's voice cries out. "Don't stop. The journey is just beginning." Over and over the words of Aslan ring in their hearts and their driving motto becomes..."Further



up and further in," where every step of the journey leads them to horizons more promising than the one before.

The image of the Christian life as a life-long journey – further up and further in - is an old one and a good one. It's a reminder that Christian discipleship is a continual process, not a destination. The forty-year journey of wandering through the wilderness proves necessary for fashioning a people who would need to depend upon God if they are to be a blessing to the rest of the world. The earliest Christians being called "People of the Way" is an image that echoes the wilderness journey, and a people who are on the move toward a more promising land and hopeful future.

As our Session moves forward with the creation of planning teams that will focus on areas of our church's life and ministry (see session corner inside), it is an indication that we are not resting on any laurels but, to use a phrase of Apostle Paul, "pressing on to what lies ahead." These are the steps we are taking – and invite you to join us as you're able – to keep moving toward a more hopeful future, trusting in the Spirit to be out ahead of us and also at work among us.

We are part of a denomination whose hallmark is "reformed and always reforming." We are always in the process of growing, evolving, striving toward what lies ahead, fostering an oxygen-rich environment in our congregation that continually grows deeper in faith while reaching wider. This will be particularly important as we enter a transition period in our church with my retirement (at the end of January) and the arrival of an interim and later a newly installed pastor.

The renowned missionary, E Stanley Jones, comments that "everything is being changed. It's not a question of whether things will change or not, but whether they are being changed up or down, for the better or for worse." And the great Scottish missionary, explorer, abolitionist, and doctor, David Livingstone, is known for saying, "I'll go anywhere with God, as long as it is forward."

It is my prayer that this forward-looking perspective and belief in the power of the Gospel is what inspires us as we look ahead, ready to move further up and further in where every step of our congregation's journey leads us to horizons more promising than the one before. With you on the journey,

This year the 2024 Alternative Gift Market will be held on December 8th in Lake View Hall.


Shopping will be available before and after worship along with catalog shopping starting on November 19th.


New **Deacon** nominees are: Linda Fuller, Rita Stoess, Tia and Nathan Nieuwsma, and Judy Richardson-Fox.






Deacon's Offering: First Sunday of Every Month
