Pastor's Corner

A thousand years have come and gone,
And near a thousand more.
Since happier light from heaven shone
Than ever shone before:
And in the hearts of old and young
A joy most joyful stirred,
That sent such news from tongue to tongue
As ears had ever heard.

And we are glad, and we will sing,
As in the days of yore;
Come all, and hearts made ready bring,
To welcome back once more
The day when first on wintry earth
A summer change began,
And, dawning in a lowly birth,
Uprose the Light of man.

This poem by Thomas Lynch was written shortly after the most grueling and heart-wrenching war our nation has ever faced, our civil war. Into those dark days came this bright poem of hope.

During the season of Advent, the days get shorter as the darkness extends longer. And each Sunday we will light another candle on our Advent wreath as a sign that our faith stands defiant against the encroaching darkness. In fact, it is into the darkness that Christ' birth shines out.

The gospels tell us the everything surrounding Jesus' birth, took place at night:

- An angel appears to shepherds who are watching their flocks by night;
- The wise men follow the star through the night;
- Herod plots the murder of Jesus and the innocent children of Bethlehem in his gloomy midnight councils.

In every way, the light of Christ's birth shines out against the surrounding darkness. It is darkness that seems so abundantly evident in these stories.

And yet what is the focus of our faith? Not the darkness, but the light. When John, for example, writes his gospel, his primary thought is that with the coming of the Christ into our world, a light has come shining in the darkness. God entered a dark world through Jesus, arriving in a bleak corner of Augustus' empire, dominated by cruel political power. Dwarfed in the headline news by the might and wealth of Caesar, Jesus came as a light into the darkness, a light that no darkness then or since has ever fully extinguished.

The family of a Palestinian friend and pastor, Alex Awad, is featured in a heartbreaking and inspiring book titled "Yet in Thy Dark Street Shineth." The title is taken from the lyrics in the hymn, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Today's Bethlehem, as well as all of the West Bank and Gaza, are experiencing a darkness that is beyond anything we could imagine. Despite being ethnically cleansed, the Palestinian Christians continue to look to the one from whom they are direct descendants. In Jesus, they see an ancestor born in Bethlehem in whom they continue to find an answer to "the hopes and fears of all the years."

As we approach the deep, dark midwinter of this season, our prayer is that the God who transcends all seasons will work in us a summer change, melting the clouds of sin and sadness and restoring them with the light of joy and gladness. With the gift of the Christ-child, God has brought a radiant light that seeks to put an end to the dark of night. Standing in opposition to this darkness, may we too radiate the light of Christ and peel back the darkness. "For there is always light," says, poet Amanda Gorman, "if only we are brave enough to see it. If only we are brave enough to be it."







Greetings everyone! I hope the power is back on for all of you and you are looking forward to the Thanksgiving Holiday. I am thankful for all of you who do so much to care for our church building! I recognize that nearly everyone serves in more than one capacity on various teams and you all do it with a smile. Thank you for your commitment!



SESSION BUSINESS: November 4, 2024

Carole VanLoo shared a word on gratitude and opened with prayer.

- 1.Approved:
 - *Ministry team reports,
 - *Holding the annual congregational meeting on January 19, 2025,
 - *Vacation days for Charlie from December 26-January 2.
- 2. Treasurer's report: 60 pledge cards are in now but more expected by mid-month. The projected budget for 2025 is \$100,000 in the negative. Raising funds and/or reducing needs/wants will be necessary. Many rates have increased that can't be helped.
- 3. The projected starting date for installation of the electrical panel is January 6th. Prep work has already begun.
- 4. Elizabeth Klein can continue in her role until Charlie retires, but can only be considered further after the interim is installed and determines whether they need additional support that would benefit the congregation.
- 5. Elders are working on their strategic planning:
- Communication challenges.- led by Carol is meeting with interested persons.
- Dede is looking for people to work on a youth ministry team.
- Curt needs a few to join him around the building issues.

- 6. Carol is hosting a Christmas brunch for session and ministry team leaders...December 14th at 11:30a at her home.
- 7. Nominating Committee has 4 elder and 5 deacon nominees.
- 8. Session Retreat will be Nov. 16, 9-2 pm at the home of Elizabeth Klein with new elders invited.
- 9. Input was requested for orientation of new elders the first of January...possibly the 4th, 5th or 11th.
- 10. Electronic voting in Congregational Meetings to the by-laws and adding Building and Grounds to the list of permanent committees were recommended by Governance, for ratification at Annual Meeting. Approved by session.
- 11. Recommendation to Session that these groups complete background checks annually (when hired or in July) as Church Mutual Insurance recommends. Groups include: Children and youth workers, Stephen Ministers/leaders, treasurer, counters, check signers and Staff. Moved and approved.
- 12. THE LIVESTREAMING SAFE AREA is to be posted for members of congregation who prefer NOT to be shown in any video spanning.
- 13. The next meeting of the Northwest Coast Presbytery is February 13th by Zoom, and May 15th in person.
- 14. Next Session Meeting is Dec. 2 with Deacons invited at 6 pm in the Lakeview Hall for a light potluck dinner/dessert.




Deacon's Offering: First Sunday of Every Month
